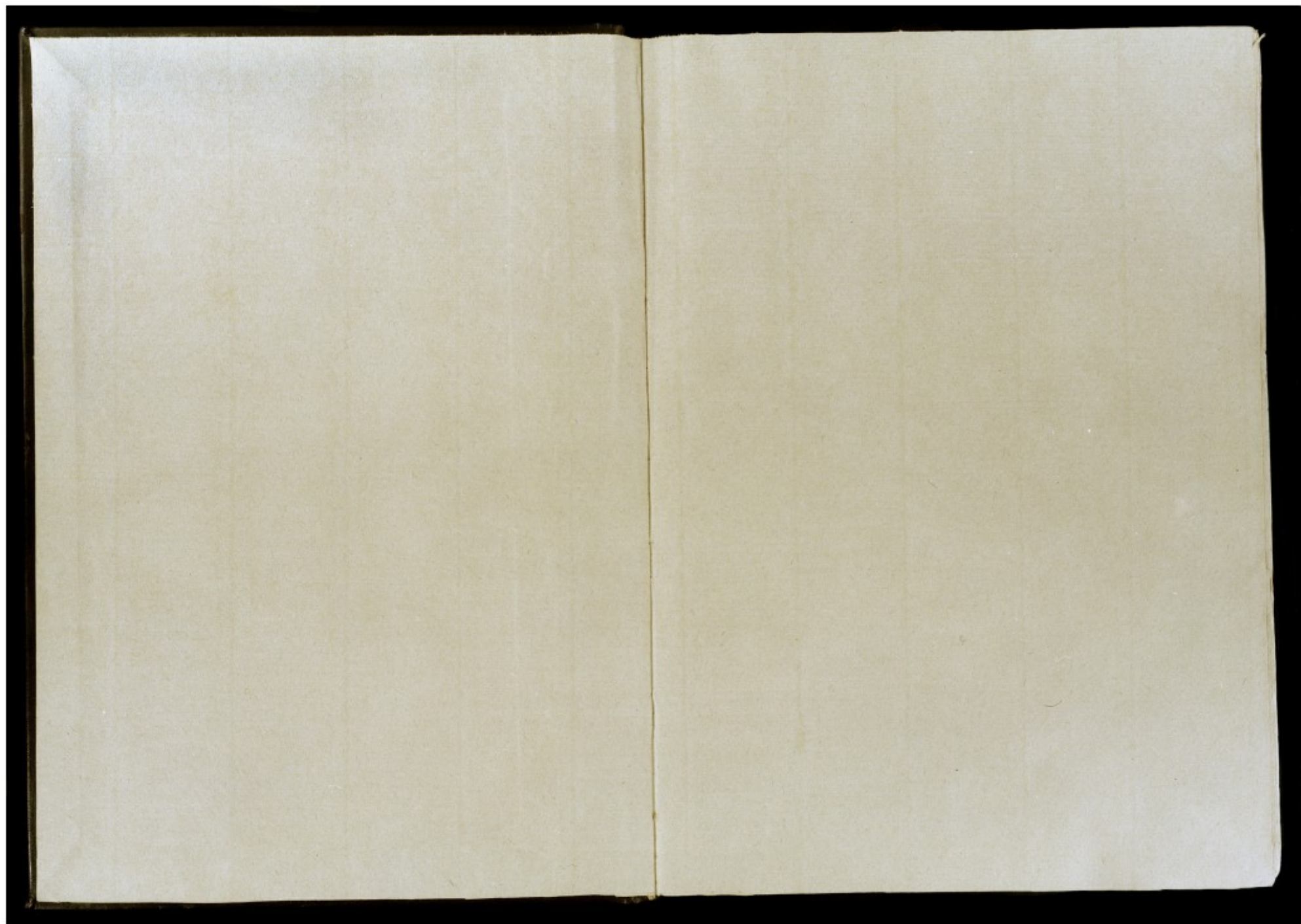
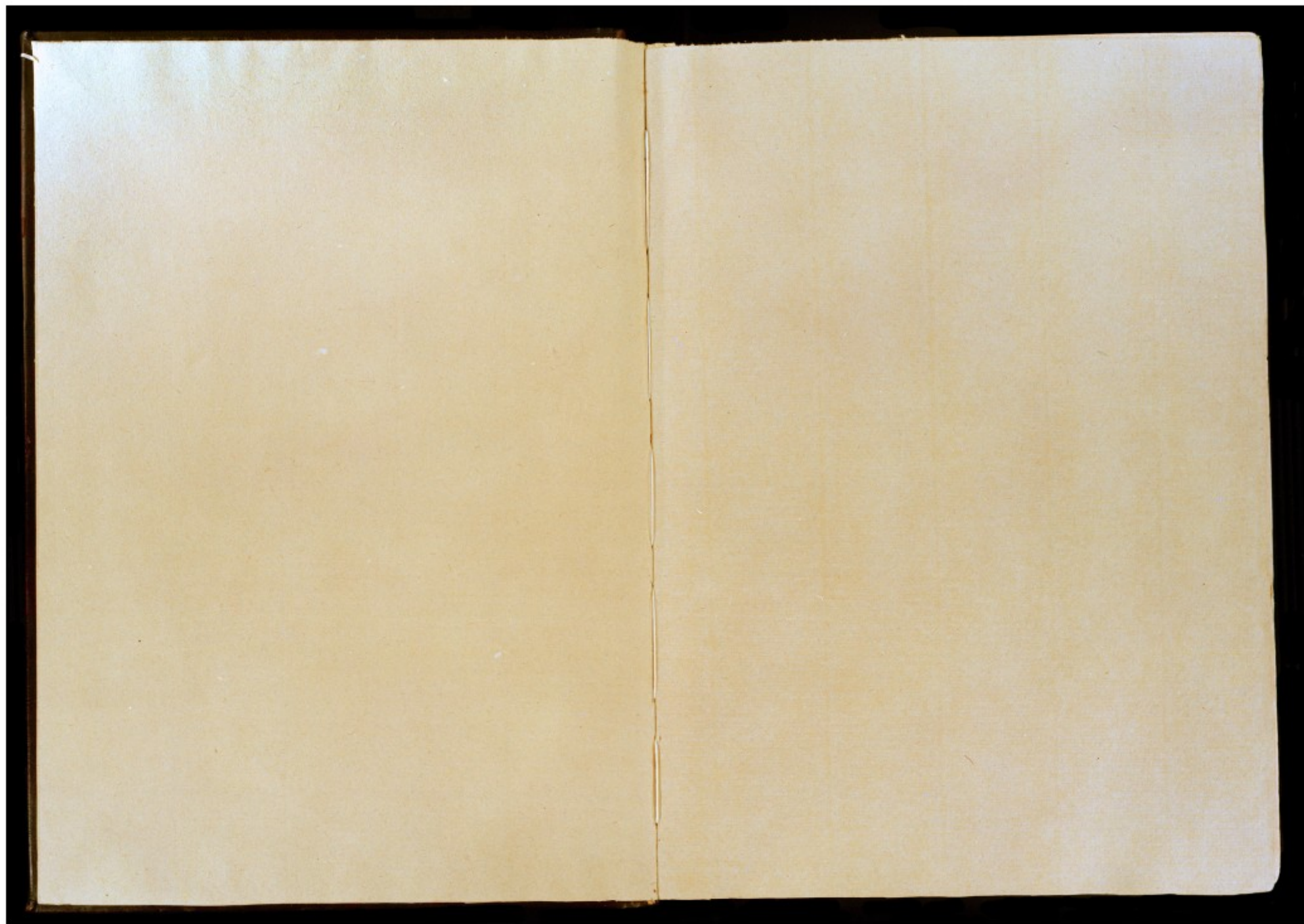




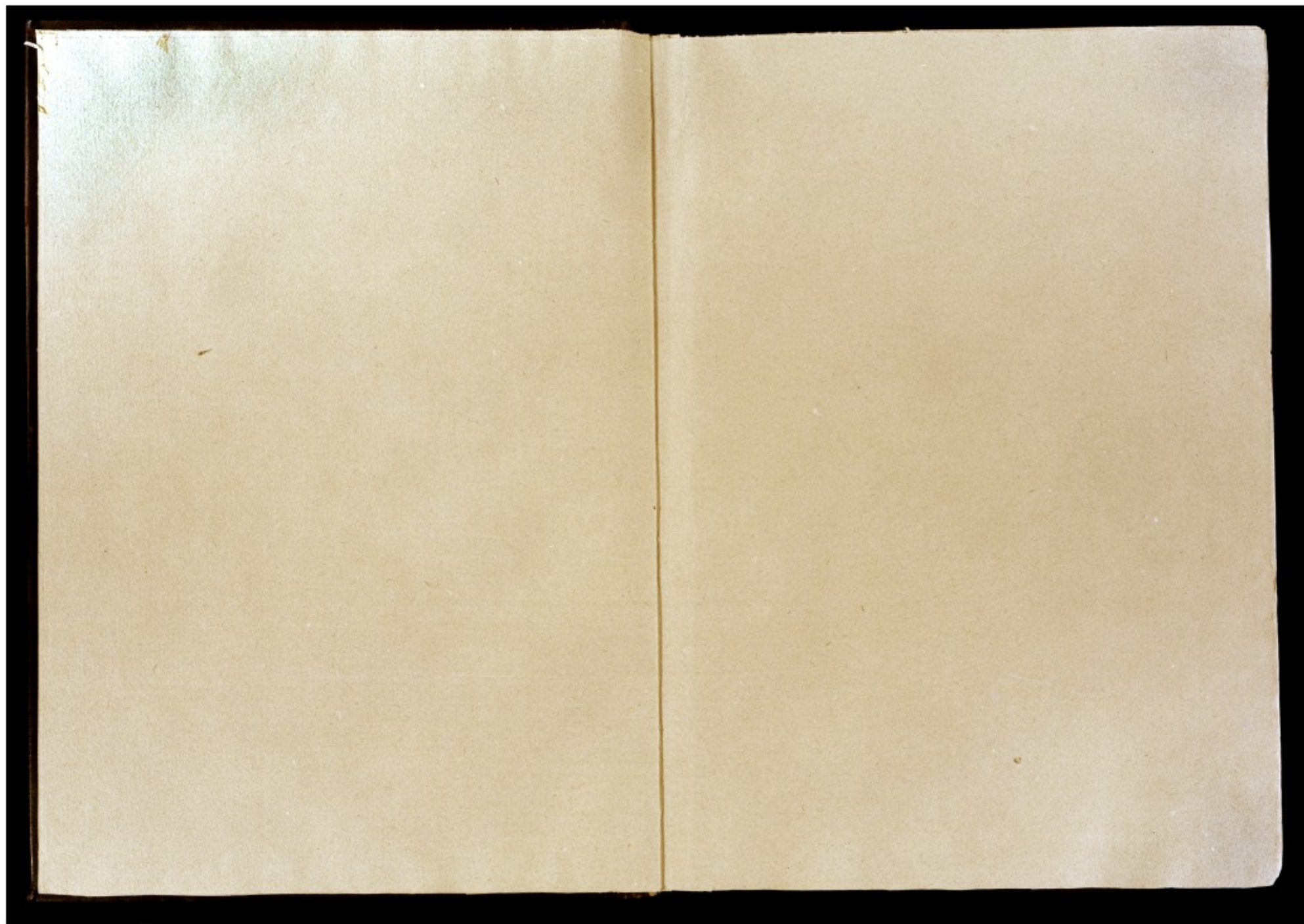

Ernest Miller has a perfect lump of locality, you could love him. He looks all animals, especially wild ones, and loves to be read to by the hour.

He and Marceline dramatize "Hjawaitha" and play Indian in various ways.

He talks to his play things and personifies everything. Talks by the hour together, without stopping - perfectly unconscious of audience.

His pictures taken at 2 years 3 months on Nov. 8th. 1901, are very manly. Such a straight forward look on his face.

Uncle Miller Hall says he looks like a Bishop in his robes, with his long yellow hair hanging over his ears. He is very obedient, asks constantly whether he can do this or that, rather than to make a mistake and displeas-us.

Ernest has been able to turn a summer sault, ever since he was 2 years old, and delights in all sorts of physical exercises and efforts.

He has such a keen appreciation of a joke, will chuckle with laughter over anything that strikes him funny.

He dearly loves to go nesting with "Mama deak" and is really no trouble at all; as he amuses himself, and is so obedient.

Ernest Miller counted up to 30 for Abbas Ernest and Miller on the evening of April 1st, 1902 at the age of 2 years and 8 mos.

## LETTERS TO THE OAK PARK BOYS.

"The Agassiz Boys" have been invited from time to time with letters from their friend Clarence E. Hemingway President of the Oak Park "Agassiz Camp" who is still in Europe. Recent letters from him to Frank Miller of his delight in meeting Brewster, Macgillivray and many other places across his intention to sail for home from Glasgow on August 30.

The following letter will be read with interest:

Douglas Isle of Man,

July 17, 1886.

My Dear Agassiz Boys—

Were you with me here with your note book and pencil you would have plenty to keep you busy. You would have to describe this town of Douglas which is on the south east of the island, about seventy-five miles from Liverpool, ninety-four miles from Dublin and nearly two hundred from Glasgow. There is a fine harbor made by Douglas Bay with a fine jetty at one side which serves for the lighter and grand location for the lighter.

The people here now comprise the summer residents of the three principal cities before mentioned. When we realize that only a few decades ago this was a favorite resort for emigrants and pikers, it seems not at all impossible when we go down the rugged, rocky, almost washed shore, and see pebbled out the caves and rocks which were once the places which concealed the stolen goods which these hazy manxmen took in their private boats.

The island is thickly wooded and there are many glens in which are running streams of clear, cold trout, in which are plenty of spotted trout. These are very beautiful and many of the trout which soon fade in the way down the rocks where it soon makes a leap and causes a beautiful waterfall some twenty feet high.

Were you to look at the flora here you would at once notice the great number of ferns and fine wild honey-suckles, and the ivy, winding over the rocks and up the trees as fine as on any <sup>any field</sup> <sup>any field</sup>.

There are the fuchsia bushes and in a mammoth growth, with shrubs as large as small lilacs in the estates with hundreds of deep red and purple blossoms.

The trees are principally the birch, much sycamore, beech, large ash branches and fruit trees similar to our own. The oak and elm are in quantities than our own. I have not seen one of our own species here or a hump-backed and white magpies, large crows, juncos, swallows, titlarks, starlings and cuckoos. The rocks are mostly hard limestone, with occasional veins of quartz and galea. There are several very fine gullies (lead) mines. There is also a penitentiary (hard) red sandstone on the coast and some of the coast rocks have yielded to the action of the waves and now show great hollowed pits and notches. Then too you will be interested to know that there are rocky shores, of a greyish nature, similar to the granite of Scotland. It looks as if they were brought by the sea during the Glacial epoch from their mother rock away off to the north west in Scotland.

The Zoology here will be glad to know that Manx cats have tails which are practically absent.

I am glad to tell you that you are exhibiting a good deal more in your Agassiz work than most of the Manx-hand boys gain in their schools and fishing smokes.

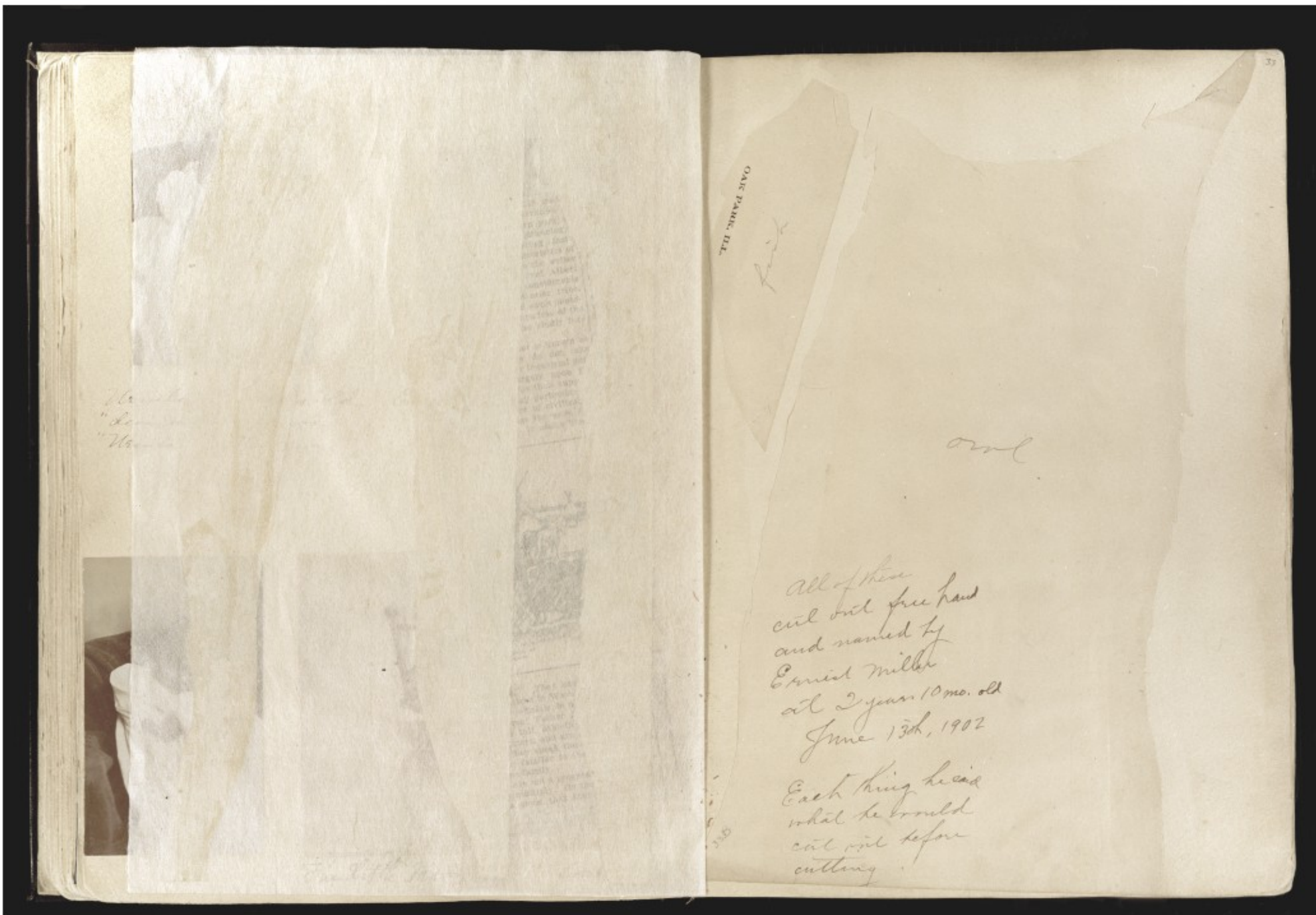
